# State of Kaitorete 2023

We are thrilled to be out on the whenua at the end of this week for our second annual State of Kaitorete (SOK).

A ropū of whānau members from Wairewa and Taumutu will return to assess and investigate ten sites across Kaitorete, documenting and sharing mātauranga over the course of two days. SOK is vital to the kaupapa of Tāwhaki as we measure the impact our mahi has over time on whenua rejuvenation and healing, and the deepening connections whānau have with Kaitorete.

Supporting this mahi are laean Cranwell, Craig Pauling, Mapihi Martin-Paul, David Perenara-O'Connell, and Tāwhaki kaimahi. Ngā mihi nui to everyone involved in the organisation and continuation of SOK.

## Runway construction underway at Kaitorete

Construction has begun on the 1-km runway being added to our Tāwhaki Aerospace Centre.

Before construction got underway, we had a whakawātea to mark the start of mahi and wish our cultural monitors and construction team well on this next phase, and we were treated to a spectacular sunrise!

Construction for the runway and hangar facilities were made possible with a \$5.4m grant from the Kānoa Regional Strategic Partnership Fund to meet urgent local and growing international aerospace demand.

The site of our current Aerospace Centre underwent years of intensive farming before Wairewa Rūnanga, Te Taumutu Rūnanga, and the Crown came together as a joint venture to purchase the whenua. We have since removed all cattle, pine tree shelter belts full of predators, and are working to rejuvenate the site.

It's hugely exciting to be creating new opportunities to help our people and whenua flourish for generations to come.

### Kia ora to Wisk

We're excited to share that we will be welcoming <u>Wisk</u> in the coming days to test their technology with us at Kaitorete. Wisk is working towards a self-flying, electric air taxi that carries passengers for short flights – offering a more sustainable transport option and taking traffic off roads in cities.

While this will be Wisk's first time flying with us, they have been testing around Takapō for several years. Wisk will be flying a very small craft at Kaitorete to trial the operating systems that will help make the air taxi possible in the future. There may be media interest in Wisk's testing and we will share this with you on our social media and website.
